What is the best thing about refereeing? The friends I have made throughout the county, province and the country, some who are lifelong friends and the chance to prove and test yourself every day you referee.

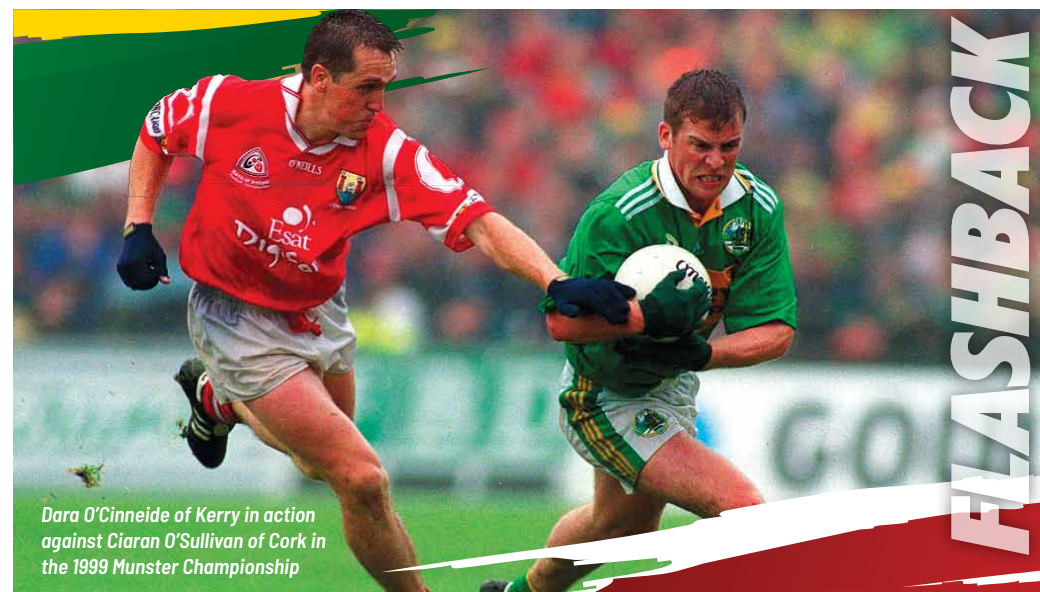

FLASHBACK

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EXTRA TIME AND FINISHING GAMES ON THE DAY

All games in the 2020 Munster GAA Senior Football & Hurling Championship that finish level after normal playing times should be completed as per the GAA Ard Chomhairle Regulations approved on the 19th January 2019 and in accordance with Rules of Specification 3.4. & 3.6 T.O. Part 2 2019, that relevant games that finish level after normal playing times should be completed as follows -

PHASE 1

- Proceed to Extra time as provided for in T.O Cuid II (two periods of ten minutes each way)

PHASE 2 (Penalty Kicks/Pucks)

If still level, a "penalty competition" to decide the outcome:

- The relevant rules in T.O. Cuid II shall apply in relation to Penalty Kicks/Pucks, unless otherwise stated.
- Penalties will be taken for goals only.
- The Referee shall choose the end at which the penalty kicks/pucks will be taken. The end may be changed by the referee if it becomes unplayable during the course of the penalties.
 - If a penalty is scored, the goal umpire, will wave the green flag once the referee has signalled
 - If the penalty is saved or missed the point umpire will signal a wide once the referee has signalled
- Each team shall register five penalty takers, a goal keeper & a substitute goal keeper with the referee and indicate in which order the penalty takers will take their penalties. (A penalty taker can also be a goalkeeper or a substitute goalkeeper.)
- Only players who are on the field of play at the end of Phase 1 (i.e. end of Extra Time), shall be allowed to be registered as a penalty taker or goalkeeper. Exception: The substitute goalkeeper can come from the team panel.
- Subject to the conditions below both teams will take five penalty kicks/pucks which are taken alternately by the teams. The game is awarded to whichever team scores more of their five penalty kicks/pucks.
 - If, before both teams have taken five penalty kicks/pucks, one team has scored more goals than the other team could score, even if they were to complete their five penalty kicks/pucks, no more penalty kicks/pucks shall be taken.
 - If, after both teams have taken five penalty kicks/pucks and both teams have scored the same number of goals, the penalty competition will continue but in sudden death format using the same five registered players until one team has scored a goal more than the other from the same number of kicks/pucks.
- In sudden death, the same sequence of penalty takers does not have to be followed as in the first round of penalty kicks/pucks.
- Each penalty kick/puck is taken by a different player. All registered players must take a penalty kick/puck before any player can take an additional penalty kick/puck.

WHERE WE ALL BELONG

CAN CORK PULL OFF A SIGNIFICANT UPSET?

The age-old rivalry of Cork and Kerry will manifest itself on the excellent playing surface of Páirc Uí Chaoimh this afternoon when the sides meet in a winner takes all Munster Semi-Final. With the 2020 Championship being delayed by five months, there are no second chances this year. To the winner, a place in the Munster Final – to the loser, it's time to look ahead to 2021.

Since the teams last met in the 2019 Munster Final, each County has seen their stock rise given subsequent performances over the last 15 months. In the case of Cork, following their Munster Final set-back, a 14-point victory over Laois ensured a place in the Super 8s. While Cork failed to secure a win against Dublin, Tyrone or Roscommon, they were competitive for long periods in all three games and the experience gained could prove invaluable for Ronan McCarthy's side looking to dine at the top table again in the near future. Of most encouragement was their performance against Dublin where they scored 1-17, more than any other county in the 2019 Championship before losing out to some late goals as Cork tired following a massive effort.

Relegation to Division 3 in the spring of 2019 was a set-back for this side which would only be rectified by immediate promotion back to Division 2. Cork went about their business in an impressive fashion in the spring-time, winning all five of their games before the competition was put on hold due to Covid-19. A comprehensive win over Louth last month secured their promotion and the Division 3 title before receiving a walkover from Longford.

Kerry on the other hand went undefeated in the 2019 Super 8s with wins over Mayo and Meath and a high scoring draw versus Donegal. This set up an All-Ireland semi-final with Tyrone and though the game was in the balance for long periods, a Stephen O'Brien goal helped the Kingdom to a six-point victory.

A place in the All-Ireland Final beckoned against a Dublin side going for 5-in-a-row. Kerry were arguably the better side in the Final before a late Dublin comeback meant the sides would have to meet again. In the replay, after an epic opening

half, an Eoin Murchan goal from the throw-in of the second half would prove a crucial score and Dublin ran out winners by six points.

As 2020 began, the fixtures decreed a meeting of Dublin and Kerry in Croke Park in January in the opening game and again, the sides would finish level. From here, Kerry were the dominant side in the Division and aside from a one point defeat at the hand of Tyrone in terrible conditions at Edendork, the Kingdom would secure narrow victories over Galway (1 pt), Meath (3 pts), Mayo (1 pt) and Monaghan (3 pts) to leave the destination of the Division 1 title in their own hands going in to the final round of fixtures.

Donegal travelled to Fitzgerald Stadium two weeks ago and with one eye on their opening round fixture in the Ulster Championship, proved no match for Kerry, losing out by 14 points. Afterwards, David Clifford lifted the cup as Kerry march on to what they hope will be a successful Championship campaign.

Looking at today's fixture, Kerry have dominated their neighbours in the Munster Championship in recent years with Cork's last victory dating back to 2012. Since then, Kerry have captured seven Munster titles in a row. After some disappointing performances against Kerry in recent years, the 2019 Munster Final gave Cork Football supporters some cause for optimism about the future, scoring three goals and losing out in the end by three points.

As mentioned above, both teams seem to have improved since then and with home advantage today, Cork will hope to pull off a significant upset. One cannot forget that while both sides won their respective Divisions in the Allianz League, Kerry were operating at two Divisions higher than Cork and unless the home side can get up to the pace of today's game from the start, ultimate success may elude them from another year. Enjoy the game.

CORK'S POWER POINT

Cork 0-17 Kerry 0-12

With seven minutes left, Daniel Goulding spun away from slotting over a point into the Blackrock end and raised an arm to the crowd in celebration. Premature? Not a chance. The win was baked and caked. As Jack O'Connor said afterwards, Cork won pulling up. Even if a subdued Darran O'Sullivan pointed two minutes later, any chance of a Kerry goal – and there had been a few – had disappeared by the break.

There was no urgency in Kerry's reaction to Goulding's score, which put Cork four points up. Seconds later, after attempting to plough what was admittedly a lonely furrow in the full-forward line, Kieran Donaghy was hauled off. Paul Galvin, whose first touch was untypically off, then made way, much to the delight of the home crowd. It was then they knew their team had won.

Goulding, in fact, had done the exact same thing in the Division 1 Final when also coming on as a substitute to make a scoring contribution to the victory. Back then, there were only a scattering of Cork souls to greet his effort. Yesterday, he had a more fitting audience who must have been satisfied with the conviction of their team.

They had been waiting three years to earn these bragging rights but that will make them all the sweeter especially given Cork's composure and the doubts hanging over Kerry's All-Ireland credentials. When previewing yesterday's game, we spoke of Kerry's superior flexibility. In fact, it was Cork who were the more so here with just one of the four forwards originally named in the team playing where he was selected (Colm O'Neill).

Kerry, on the other hand, lined out their attack as O'Connor had announced early last week. The persuasive manner of Cork's second-half display also put to bed any fears at half-time the result of the game might be swayed by the officiating. David Coldrick's laissez-faire approach had threatened to damage the game as a spectacle too. In all, 27 frees had been awarded with Anthony Maher in additional time the only yellow card recipient of the first-half.

With such leeway, both teams, more so Cork, indulged in a lot of cynical play safe in the knowledge they wouldn't be blown up too much. Galvin, having been ticked, should have been yellow-carded in the 21st minute. Nicholas Murphy was also fortunate to escape more than a warning. At the interval, Cork were three points up – 0-7 to 0-4 – after finishing it stronger.

But they had also started the better too despite Colm Cooper stumbling when through on goal in the opening minute. Cork were 0-3 to 0-1 up after six minutes, Ciarán Sheehan – a late replacement for Fintan Goold – and Donncha O'Connor pointing after O'Connor and Declan O'Sullivan had exchanged points. Murphy, who had come in for Pearse O'Neill, was positioned at the edge of the square and was marshalled well by Aidan O'Mahony before he enjoyed a purple patch midway through the second-half.

Kerry burst back with a flurry of points which put them ahead for the first and only time in the 20th minute. All three scores came from Cooper's pegs, the latter two from frees. Prior to the last of those, he had a goal chance denied by Alan Quirke after Donaghy, who should have kicked towards the net himself, passed to him.

The resultant 45 was put wide by Brendan Kealy, one of two he failed to convert on a day when Bryan Sheehan's dead-ball expertise was sorely missed. It was then Cork's turn to score three on the bounce, O'Neill making up for a miss from an easy free with a delightful point, which was quickly followed by one from Paul Kerrigan and then an O'Connor free after sloppy play from Seamus Scanlon. Although Kerry didn't score for the remainder of the half, Quirke was sharp to block a Donaghy shot after Darran O'Sullivan and Cooper had linked up.

How Kerry rued that spurned opportunity as O'Neill floated over a free to put Cork three ahead following an O'Mahony foul. With Scanlon and an unlucky Kieran O'Leary exiting at half-time, Johnny Buckley and James O'Donoghue brought vitality to the Kerry attack. O'Donoghue, with his first touch, and Declan O'Sullivan had Cork's lead whittled

down to one two minutes in but Cork managed to keep their noses in front. They restored their three-point lead in the 44th minute after Paudie Kissane punted over an outside-of-the-boot effort following O'Connor and Cooper scores.

Galvin responded with one of his own and O'Donoghue grabbed his second only for Kerrigan to punish a Peter Crowley mistake. Murphy had a shot snuffed out by Brendan Kealy in the 54th minute but Goulding reacted quickest to put three between the teams again. Twice Kerry got within two via a Cooper free and an Eoin Brosnan point but O'Connor responded each time, the first after a Murphy lay-off and then almost directly from a Kerry kick-out. Goulding's defining score, reacting quicker than Declan O'Sullivan to a Tomás Ó Sé pass, had Cork's supporters believing.

With two of Kerry's leaders taken off the field, it was left to O'Neill to perform the coup de graces. Kerry already knew their fate.

PLAYING RULE MOTION 1 THE ADVANCED MARK

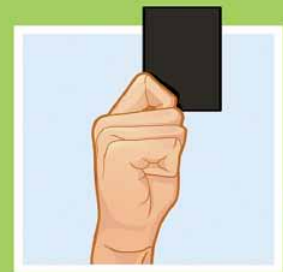
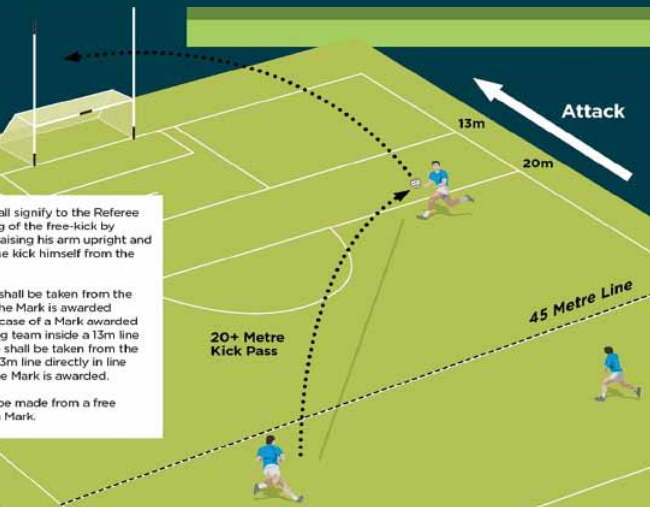
The Referee shall award a Mark in either of the following circumstances:

- (i) When a player catches the ball cleanly from a kick-out, without it touching the ground, on or past the 45m line nearest the kick-out point, or
- (ii) When a player catches the ball cleanly on or inside a 45m line from a kick in play (i.e. not from set-play) delivered by an attacking player on or beyond the opposing team's 45m line, that travels at least 20m and without it touching the ground.

The player shall signify to the Referee if he is availing of the free-kick by immediately raising his arm upright and then taking the kick himself from the hands.

The free kick shall be taken from the point where the Mark is awarded except in the case of a Mark awarded to an attacking team inside a 13m line when the free shall be taken from the point on the 13m line directly in line with where the Mark is awarded.

A score may be made from a free awarded for a Mark.

PLAYING RULE MOTION 2 THE SIN BIN

To order off, for ten minutes in a Sin-Bin, a player who commits a Cynical Behaviour Foul/Infraction by taking his name and showing him a Black Card, provided the player has not committed a Cautionable Infraction (Yellow Card) previously in the game.

If on resuming play, the player commits a further Cynical Behaviour Foul/

infraction, he shall be ordered off by showing him a Black Card, followed by a Red Card.

The time period in the Sin-Bin shall be of 10 minutes duration, irrespective of delays.

The ten minutes shall traverse normal time (which includes additional time) and Extra Time, if played.

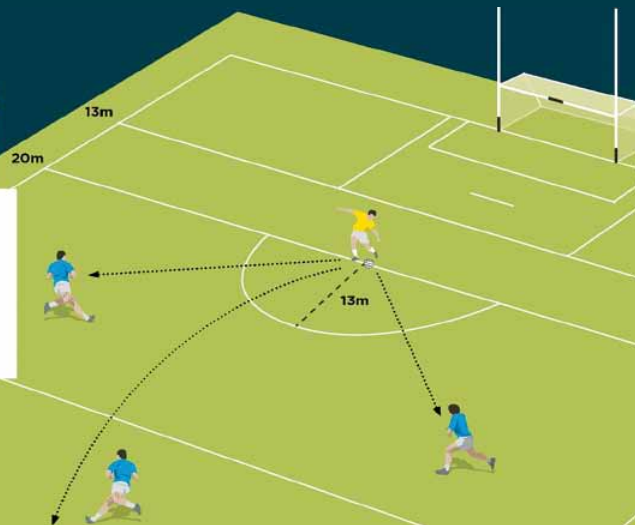
PLAYING RULE MOTION 3 THE KICK OUT

The kick-out shall be taken off the ground from the centre point on the 20m line and shall be kicked forward.

All players, other than the Goalkeeper (and another player if the goalkeeper is not taking the kick-out) shall be

outside the 20m line, outside the arc and 13m from the ball until it has been kicked.

Penalty: Cancel kick-out. Throw-in the ball on defenders' 20m line in front of the scoring space.
