# EXTRA TIME AND FINISHING GAMES ON THE DAY

All games in the 2020 Munster GAA Senior Football & Hurling Championship that finish level after normal playing times should be completed as per the GAA Ard Chomhairle Regulations approved on the 19th January 2019 and in accordance with Rules of Specification 3.4. & 3.6 T.O. Part 2 2019, that relevant games that finish level after normal playing times should be completed as follows -

## PHASE 1

- Proceed to Extra time as provided for in T.O Cuid II (two periods of ten minutes each way)

## PHASE 2 (Penalty Kicks/Pucks)

If still level, a "penalty competition" to decide the outcome:

- The relevant rules in T.O. Cuid II shall apply in relation to Penalty Kicks/Pucks, unless otherwise stated.
- Penalties will be taken for goals only.
- The Referee shall choose the end at which the penalty kicks/pucks will be taken. The end may be changed by the referee if it becomes unplayable during the course of the penalties.
  - If a penalty is scored, the goal umpire, will wave the green flag once the referee has signalled
  - If the penalty is saved or missed the point umpire will signal a wide once the referee has signalled
- Each team shall register five penalty takers, a goal keeper & a substitute goal keeper with the referee and indicate in which order the penalty takers will take their penalties. (A penalty taker can also be a goalkeeper or a substitute goalkeeper.)
- Only players who are on the field of play at the end of Phase 1 (i.e. end of Extra Time), shall be allowed to be registered as a penalty taker or goalkeeper. Exception: The substitute goalkeeper can come from the team panel.
- Subject to the conditions below both teams will take five penalty kicks/pucks which are taken alternately by the teams. The game is awarded to whichever team scores more of their five penalty kicks/pucks.
  - If, before both teams have taken five penalty kicks/pucks, one team has scored more goals than the other team could score, even if they were to complete their five penalty kicks/pucks, no more penalty kicks/pucks shall be taken.
  - If, after both teams have taken five penalty kicks/pucks and both teams have scored the same number of goals, the penalty competition will continue but in sudden death format using the same five registered players until one team has scored a goal more than the other from the same number of kicks/pucks.
- In sudden death, the same sequence of penalty takers does not have to be followed as in the first round of penalty kicks/pucks.
- Each penalty kick/puck is taken by a different player. All registered players must take a penalty kick/puck before any player can take an additional penalty kick/puck.

# HISTORY IRELAND PODCAST

**Sunday 21st November, 1920. The great challenge match between Tipperary and Dublin. Tipperary footballer Michael Hogan along with 13 innocent spectators lost their lives on that fateful day 100 years ago in Croke Park, a date which changed the course of Irish history and forever changed the history of the GAA.**

History Ireland in association with Tipperary County Council Heritage Office and the Tipperary GAA Bloody Sunday Committee has recently recorded a panel discussion podcast on Bloody Sunday which is now available to view. Chaired by History Ireland Editor Tommy Graham hear the insights and perspectives from this excellent panel of speakers:

**Aogan Ó Fearghail**, Former President of the GAA; **John Flannery**, Historian from Ormond Historical Society; **Enda O’Sullivan**, Secretary of the Tipperary GAA Bloody Sunday Committee; **Jayne Sutcliffe**, Tipperary Museum of Hidden History.

The panel journey through the history, significance and impact of this momentous event during the War of Independence with particular reference to the GAA within the Premier County.



Hear some poignant personal stories of the victims and the players along with fascinating insights into how the events of the day unfolded in such a tragic and brutal manner.

The panel discuss the story of Michael Hogan from Grangemockler, his tragic death, his famous siblings and the accounts of his funeral back in Tipperary following Bloody Sunday.

Covid 19 has meant that a number of planned events to commemorate Bloody Sunday were deferred however this recording has allowed an online history discussion to take place which is now available for viewing. The recording of the podcast was supported by Tipperary County Council and the Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Sport and Media.

# CAN TIPPERARY REVERSE 2019 DEFEAT TO LIMERICK?

**This afternoon, either Limerick or Tipperary will book their place in the 2020 Munster Senior Football Final. Its over thirteen months since the draws were made for the 2020 GAA Senior Championships and for the first time since 2012, Cork and Kerry were at the same side of the draw.**

Some commentators are not aware that such a scenario could have happened at any time since 2014 as the semi-final draws since then have been devoid of any seeding. Alas, the draws each year have dictated otherwise but for 2020, an opportunity existed for any of the other four counties in the Province to qualify for the Munster Final by securing two Championship victories.

In the case of Tipperary, its just four years since they contested a Munster Final thanks to 2016 victories over

Waterford and Cork. Alas, the Premier County lost to Kerry by 10 points in the Final before making a run in the All-Ireland series, ultimately losing out narrowly to Mayo in the All-Ireland Semi-Final.

Since then, Tipperary's only wins in Munster had been two Quarter-Final successes against Waterford before last weekend's Quarter-Final versus Clare. Since 2016, Tipperary's ranking in Munster has fallen and following last year's seven-point defeat at the hands of Limerick, one could argue Tipperary had fallen to fifth out of six teams in the Province.

After securing their Division 3 status with two hard earned victories over Offaly and Leitrim, David Power's side put in a much-improved performance last Sunday when they got the better of Clare thanks to early goals in both halves from Conor Sweeney and Bill Maher.

It was a notable result for Tipperary against an established Division 2 side and one which will give them confidence coming in to today's game.

Limerick on the other hand have had a successful 2020, securing promotion from Division 4 following an away victory against Sligo in the final round. This followed the success in the McGrath Cup back in January which seems a long time ago now.

Last Saturday night, Limerick travelled to Fraher Field Dungarvan to take on Waterford for the third time in 2020. After narrow victories over Waterford in the McGrath Cup and the first round of the Allianz Football League, this meeting was over as a contest early on as goals by Cillian Fahy and Adrian Enright put the Shannonsiders in to a nine-point lead after 30 minutes. The remainder of the game was played at a pedestrian pace as despite their best efforts, Waterford could make no in-roads in to the deficit and Limerick picked off the necessary scores to maintain their advantage, eventually winning by 2-14 to 0-9.

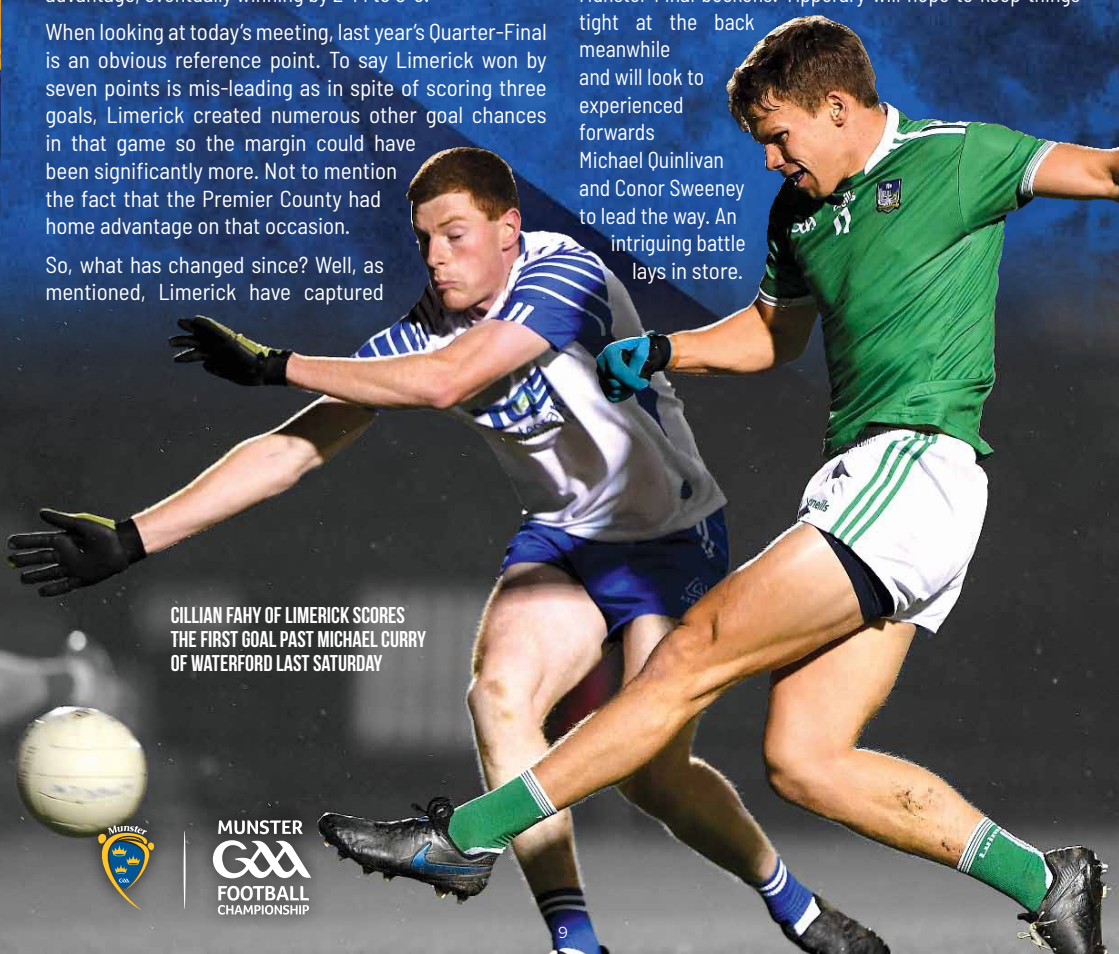
When looking at today's meeting, last year's Quarter-Final is an obvious reference point. To say Limerick won by seven points is mis-leading as in spite of scoring three goals, Limerick created numerous other goal chances in that game so the margin could have been significantly more. Not to mention the fact that the Premier County had home advantage on that occasion.

So, what has changed since? Well, as mentioned, Limerick have captured

two trophies in 2020 to date in the competitions for which they have entered which has surely boosted the confidence of Billy Lee's charges. And on this occasion, Limerick will have home advantage. Surely this is Limerick's game to lose?

And yet, more of the pundits have tipped Tipperary to be successful here this afternoon. Sure, Tipperary plied their trade in a higher Division and secured an impressive victory over Clare last Sunday. Under new management, teams often get a bounce and David Power's introduction has seen a number of the more established players return to form. However, it must be said that aside from a win over Waterford in Fraher Field Dungarvan back in 2016, Tipperary have failed to win an away game in the Munster Championship since 2014.

All in all, this game is shaping up to be a close contest. Limerick showed last year their ability to create goal chances and if they can take their opportunities today, a place in the Munster Final beckons. Tipperary will hope to keep things tight at the back meanwhile and will look to experienced forwards Michael Quinlivan and Conor Sweeney to lead the way. An intriguing battle lays in store.

# LIMERICK CLAIM FIRST MUNSTER WIN SINCE 2012 WITH TIPPERARY SHOCK

## LIMERICK 3-11 TIPPERARY 1-10

Limerick produced the first shock of the Championship at Semple Stadium with a remarkable seven-point defeat of Tipperary. They earned the right to meet Cork in the Munster semi-final thanks to goals in the final 23 minutes from Iain Corbett, Cillian Fahy, and Peter Nash.

The 2016 All-Ireland semi-finalists were totally flat throughout, although the sides were rarely separated until deep into the second-half. Nash's clincher arrived after a Michael Quinlivan goal, which ultimately proved a mere consolation. 2,165 spectators witnessed the upset, with the minority from Limerick racing onto the pitch to embrace their heroes at full-time.

Limerick had gone seven years without a Munster Championship

win, and three since their last Championship win of any type, which looked likely to continue away to a Tipp team with their most pressing injury worries behind them

But when Corbett surged forward, not for the first time, it proved decisive. His run could have been missed as Darragh Treacy attempted to hold possession, but he heard the call, and sent Corbett in to blast home. 1-9 to 0-8 was the score after 47 minutes.

Then, a 56th-minute Jamie Lee shot dropped short and was snatched by Cillian Fahy, who hammered it to the net. The clock had struck 59 minutes and the wide count hit ten before Tipp's first score of the half – a Conor Sweeney free. Limerick kicked on, with points from Lee and Fahy, the latter a goal chance, to extend the lead to eight, 2-11 to 0-9.

Quinlivan somehow conjured up a Tipp goal with six minutes to go, wriggling out of a dead end and finding the corner of the net from 14 yards out. A Liam McGrath free cut the lead to four. But the nerves didn't last long. A huge mark by Tommie Childs, a run by Seamus O'Carroll, a shot

by Sean McSweeney somehow saved, but Nash followed in to force the ball over the line. Game over.

The scores were tied at half-time, with Limerick doing most of the front-running. They only trailed twice, and quickly responded with a run of scores on both occasions. Sean O'Dea led the defensive effort early on, making two valuable interceptions when left man-on-man against a potent, but misfiring, Tipp full-forward line.

Lee and Adrian English did most of Limerick's early scoring, and kicked the first two points, although when Steven O'Brien kicked a fine point after a mark, Tipp led 0-3 to 0-2. Had corner-back Shane O'Connell held his nerve in front of goal, that could've been more, but Limerick had more chances for goal. Corbett ran from his own half to the Tipp 14-yard line before blazing over, while O'Carroll and Paul Maher also saw chances blocked or intercepted.

Still, they moved 0-6 to 0-4 clear, with Lee celebrating the pick of the scores with a jubilant roar and fist-pump towards the sideline. It was all going to plan.

The midfielders were enjoying an ocean of space as both teams pressed kick-outs, with Childs and Liam Casey claiming marks and playing on to set up scores. The latter, a McGrath free, tied us up again.

Liam Kearns had seen enough by the break. Robbie Kiely, on his return to action,

and Paul Maher were both withdrawn, with Bill Maher and Liam Boland brought on. There was no improvement though. The opposite, if anything. Corbett kicked the first score for Limerick, followed by five Tipperary misses – wides from a Sweeney free, Boland, and three impatient Quinlivan misses; two short and one wide.

The Tipp misses kept on coming after the first goal. Steven O'Brien wide. Jack Kennedy, just on, blocked down. Limerick joined them with three wides of their own, but their late goal blast was enough.

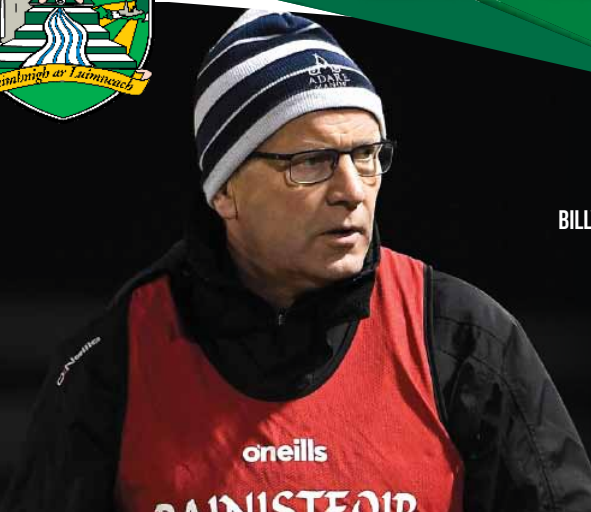

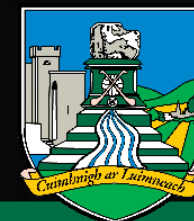

## PLAYING RULE MOTION 1 THE ADVANCED MARK

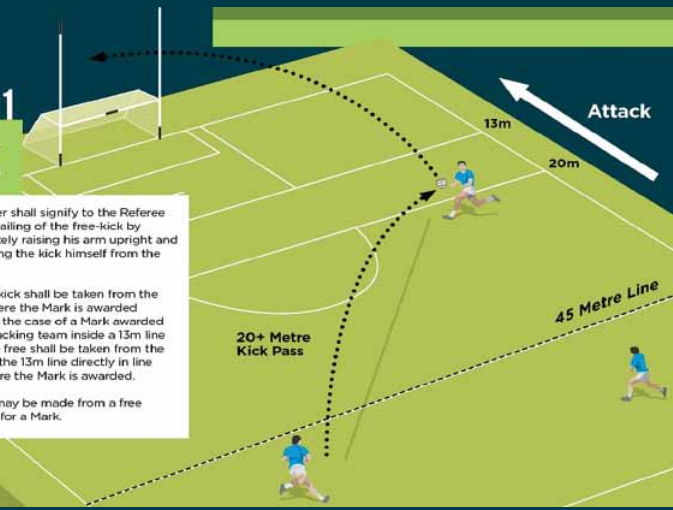
The Referee shall award a Mark in either of the following circumstances:

- (i) When a player catches the ball cleanly from a kick-out, without it touching the ground, on or past the 45m line nearest the kick-out point. **or**
- (ii) When a player catches the ball cleanly on or inside a 45m line from a kick in play (i.e. not from set-play) delivered by an attacking player on or beyond the opposing team's 45m line, that travels at least 20m and without it touching the ground.

The player shall signify to the Referee if he is availing of the free-kick by immediately raising his arm upright and then taking the kick himself from the hands.

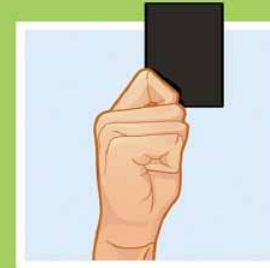
The free kick shall be taken from the point where the Mark is awarded except in the case of a Mark awarded to an attacking team inside a 13m line when the free shall be taken from the point on the 13m line directly in line with where the Mark is awarded.

A score may be made from a free awarded for a Mark.

## PLAYING RULE MOTION 2 THE SIN BIN



1 BLACK CARD IS SHOWN



2 10 MINUTE CLOCK STARTS ONCE THE PLAYER HAS LEFT THE FIELD OF PLAY. GAME WILL RE-COMMENCE AT THE SAME TIME THAT THE SIN-BIN PERIOD WILL COMMENCE.

To order off, for ten minutes in a Sin-Bin, a player who commits a Cynical Behaviour Foul/Infraction by taking his name and showing him a Black Card, provided the player has not committed a Cautionable Infraction (Yellow Card) previously in the game.

Infraction, he shall be ordered off by showing him a Black Card, followed by a Red Card.

The time period in the Sin-Bin shall be of 10 minutes duration, irrespective of delays.

The ten minutes shall traverse normal time (which includes additional time) and Extra Time, if played.

If on resuming play, the player commits a further Cynical Behaviour Foul/

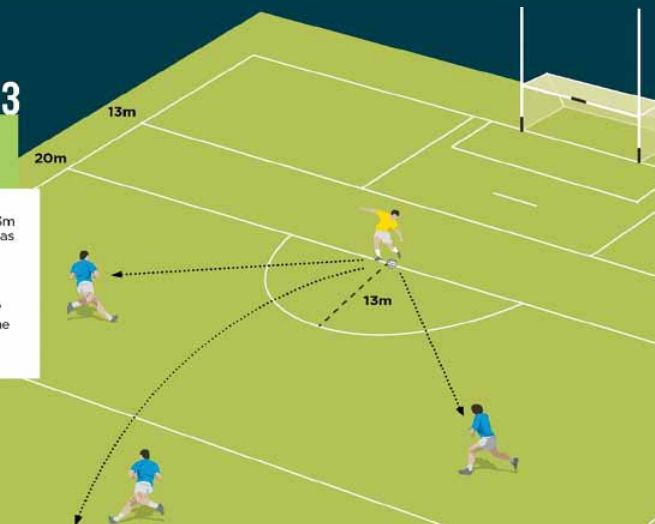
## PLAYING RULE MOTION 3 THE KICK OUT

The kick-out shall be taken off the ground from the centre point on the 20m line and shall be kicked forward.

All players, other than the Goalkeeper (and another player if the goalkeeper is not taking the kick-out) shall be

outside the 20m line, outside the arc and 13m from the ball until it has been kicked.

**Penalty:** Cancel kick-out. Throw-in the ball on defenders' 20m line in front of the scoring space.
