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EXTRA TIME AND FINISHING GAMES ON THE DAY

All games in the 2020 Munster GAA Senior Hurling Championship that finish level after normal playing times should be completed as per the GAA Ard Chomhairle Regulations approved on the 19th January 2019 and in accordance with Rules of Specification 3.4. & 3.6 T.O. Part 2 2019, that relevant games that finish level after normal playing times should be completed as follows -

PHASE 1

- Proceed to Extra time as provided for in T.O Cuid II (two periods of ten minutes each way)

PHASE 2 (Penalty Kicks/Pucks)

If still level, a "penalty competition" to decide the outcome:

- The relevant rules in T.O. Cuid II shall apply in relation to Penalty Kicks/Pucks, unless otherwise stated.
- Penalties will be taken for goals only.
- The Referee shall choose the end at which the penalty kicks/pucks will be taken. The end may be changed by the referee if it becomes unplayable during the course of the penalties.
- If a penalty is scored, the goal umpire, will wave the green flag once the referee has signalled.
- If the penalty is saved or missed the point umpire will signal a wide once the referee has signalled.
- Each team shall register five penalty takers, a goal keeper & a substitute goal keeper with the referee and indicate in which order the penalty takers will take their penalties. (A penalty taker can also be a goalkeeper or a substitute goalkeeper.)
- Only players who are on the field of play at the end of Phase 1 (i.e. end of Extra Time), shall be allowed to be registered as a penalty taker or goalkeeper. Exception: The substitute goalkeeper can come from the team panel.
- Subject to the conditions below both teams will take five penalty kicks/pucks which are taken alternately by the teams. The game is awarded to whichever team scores more of their five penalty kicks/pucks.
 - If, before both teams have taken five penalty kicks/pucks, one team has scored more goals than the other team could score, even if they were to complete their five penalty kicks/pucks, no more penalty kicks/pucks shall be taken.
 - If, after both teams have taken five penalty kicks/pucks and both teams have scored the same number of goals, the penalty competition will continue but in sudden death format using the same five registered players until one team has scored a goal more than the other from the same number of kicks/pucks.
 - In sudden death, the same sequence of penalty takers does not have to be followed as in the first round of penalty kicks/pucks.
 - Each penalty kick/puck is taken by a different player. All registered players must take a penalty kick/puck before any player can take an additional penalty kick/puck.

HENRY SHEFFLIN - 2012

After recovering from four operations in five years to claim the 'Hurler of the Year' award for the third time in 2012, Henry Shefflin duly cemented his status as one of the greatest sidemen in the history of our fabled sport. A supreme hurling brain, he has inspired thousands with his 'no no no' leadership and his vast and astonishing range of skills.



TONY KELLY - 2013

Pile of foot, blessed from the heavens with a silky strike. Tony Kelly's hectic frisks moved the masses in 2013 when he made history by collecting both the Hurler of the Year and Young Hurler of the Year awards. Just 19, Tony was already a prince of the game, piercing his way past Cianus as Clare won their first All-Ireland SFC title since 1977 and also driving the county to triumph in that year's All-Ireland Under-21 championship.



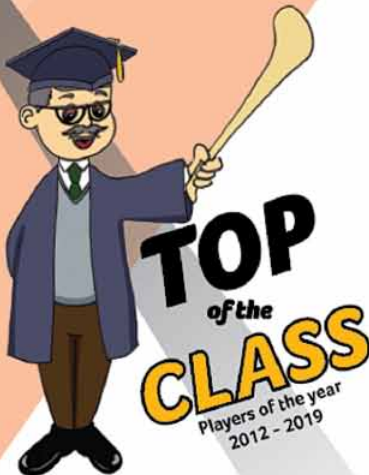
RICHIE HOGAN - 2014

All year long Richie Hogan was the key cog in Kerry's battleship. Never one to lean on the luxury of a second spout, he hit four points in their opening championship game, hit 0-7 in two games against Galway, and grabbed a vital goal that stayed Limerick and battled with 'fl' to bring Tipperary down. His manic intensity, flawless paw, scorching pace, salvaging hunger for ball, and ability to pop up unnoticed in enemy territory made Hogan the hottest property in hurling in 2014.



TJ REID - 2015

With every passing year of his career, TJ Reid's legend grew. Born with wholesome skills and a gritty work ethic, his desire to learn and improve even further helped him draw all those ingredients into the pot to arrive at the perfect one. In 2015, Cianus was assured in a season that saw him hit 3-25 in just three outings, averaging 11 points a game. Leading to the skies, fetching the ball from the clouds, scorning the grass and raising flags - Reid did it all in a golden year.



AUSTIN GLEESON - 2016

The versatile 21-year-old man-of-the-art arrived effortlessly from defence into attack with spectacular results in 2016. Against Clare in Munster, he was sensational as he scored six special points, five of them from play. In both the draw and replayed All-Ireland semi-finals against Kerry he was equally prolific, hitting a combined 1-7 from play. Austin turned the game technicolour with his 'fl', scoring fetches, turbo-charged runs, spectacular score-taking, and raw physicality to claim both the Hurler and Young Hurler awards.



JOE CANNING - 2017

The players aligned and destiny was fulfilled when Joe Canning became the first Galway player to win the Hurler of the Year award since the late 1980s to do so in 1988. All year long Smiddy Joe was setting the day, pointing his own way. He scored 0-9 in the All-Ireland final win over Waterford. But to get there, Joe found a new gap point to beat Tipperary in the All-Ireland semi-final to go down as one of the greatest scores of all - scored the original 16-year-old with 46 points in Galway's glorious campaign.



CIAN LYNCH - 2018

It was a season of Clay's that took both in its stride. He could find the right balance in a number of different team roles. He drove goals, drove power and pace of nature before a good 10 minutes in the second half of the All-Ireland final. With a flourish in his own right, Cian Lynch from Kerry was in 2018.



SEAMUS CALLANAN - 2019

Seamus continued to shine at the Bank of Ireland GAA Hurling All-Ireland final in 2019. An Ireland Final he went down as one of the best, it took a moment to work his way into a goal to deny a potential game, something only the great Eddie Keenan could have managed. Tipperary and Dublin followed the season with a 1-14 win, having been previously denied having a lead without a score for ten minutes. Finally it was a victory in 2019 for the game's young men.

Halloween Night thriller in store

Cork and Waterford square up this evening under the lights of Semple Stadium Thurles for a place in the 2020 Munster Senior Hurling Final.

Waterford do so on the back of a winless Championship run of 9 games dating back to the 2017 All-Ireland Semi-Final victory over today's opponents Cork. Following defeat in the 2017 All-Ireland Final to Galway, Waterford under the management of Derek McGrath secured 1 point out of a possible 8 in the 2018 Round-Robin, conceding 7-98. A change of management in 2019 saw Páraic Fanning's side qualify for the League Final before shipping a substantial defeat to Limerick followed by four heavy defeats in the Munster Round-Robin, losing by an average of 13 points, conceding 7-104.

Liam Cahill took the Waterford Bainisteoir role for the 2020 season following All-Ireland success for Tipperary

at Minor, Under 20 and Under 21 level. Cahill's first League match saw the Deise pitted against the Rebel County and the defensive frailties were very much in evidence as Conor Lehane and Shane Kingston scored Cork goals in the opening three minutes.

Waterford to their credit did not panic and by aided by a Patrick Curran goal, led at the interval by two points. The exchanges were even in the second half but with Cork hitting 17 wides on the day, a late Shane Kingston goal would serve as a consolation score with Waterford winning by 1-24 to 3-17.

Waterford would go on to secure subsequent victories over Galway and Westmeath with their only defeats coming at the hands of 2020 All-Ireland favourites Limerick and Tipperary. After the concession of three goals in the opening game, Waterford would only concede just two further goals (1 each to Westmeath and Limerick) over their remaining four matches which



shows the progress being made under the tutelage of Liam Cahill and his management team.

Waterford are certainly a team in transition and with players such as the Mahonys (Philip and Paraic), Noel Connors, Maurice Shanahan and Brick Walsh not involved today, it gives an opportunity for a new generation of Waterford hurlers to make their mark.

Cork on the other hand have been more impressive in Munster in recent years, winning the 2017 and 2018 Munster titles before qualifying for the knockout stages in third place in the 2019 Round-Robin. Their problems in the past three years have been exposed in Croke Park, losing knockout games to Waterford, Limerick and Kilkenny respectively. No more than Waterford, Cork's defensive record has been a concern, conceding 4-19, 3-32 and 2-27 in those meetings.

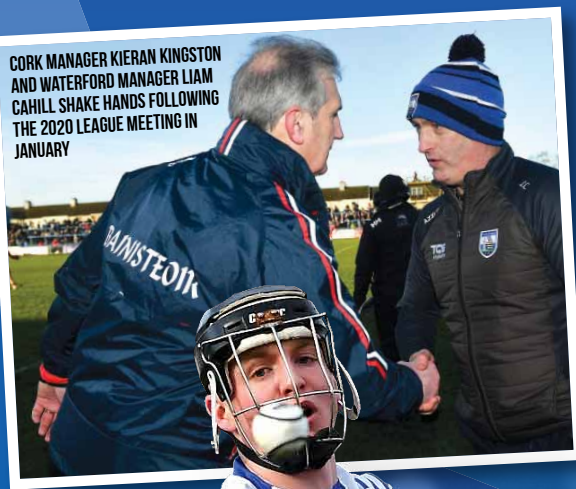
Under the returning management reign of Kieran Kingston, Cork managed to win two of their five games in the 2020 Allianz Hurling League, ending up as the second highest scorers but also finishing as the team which conceded the second most points, doing marginally better than Westmeath.

Cork have a number of new players coming on stream having qualified for the last two All-Ireland Finals at Under 21 and Under 20 level. However, at a time when Kieran Kingston is looking for new talent in defense, it's worth noting that Cork have conceded a total of 8 goals to Liam Cahill managed Tipperary sides in those two recent All-Ireland Finals.

If the Rebel County can solve the problems at the back, then they would be a force for anyone with attacking players such as Conor Lehane, Seamus Harnedy, Alan Cadogan, Shane Kingston and Patrick Horgan sure to notch up a high score any day they take to the field.

If the recent rivalry is anything to go by between Cork and Waterford, scores are sure to be plentiful here today. If Waterford's new players can get up to the speed of Munster Championship early on, this could be a thriller with a place in the 2020 Munster Final on offer. Enjoy the game!

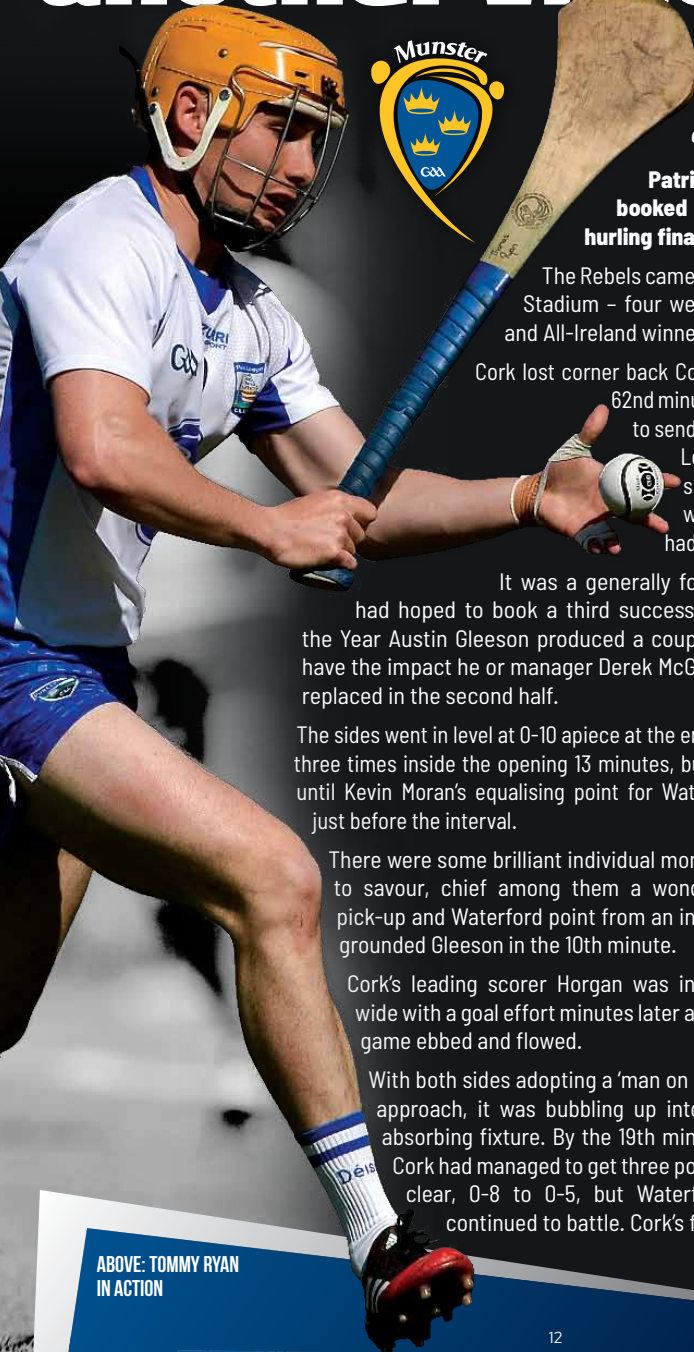

Classy Cork register another victory



CORK 0-23 WATERFORD 1-15

Patrick Horgan scored 10 points as Cork booked their place in a first Munster senior hurling final since 2014.

The Rebels came good again to defeat Waterford at Semple Stadium – four weeks after defeating last year’s provincial and All-Ireland winners Tipperary at the same venue.

Cork lost corner back Colm Spillane to a second yellow card in the 62nd minute, but held out in front of 33,163 spectators to send Waterford heading for the qualifiers. Conor Lehane was deemed fit enough to start, and scored four points, but he limped off late on with a recurrence of the ankle problem that had threatened his participation.

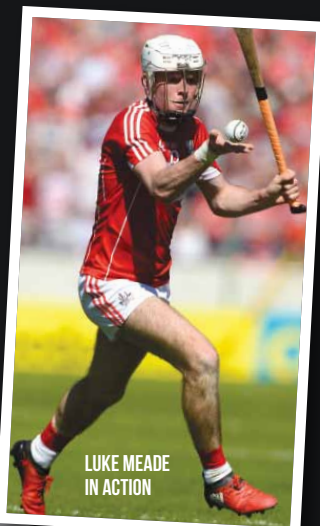
It was a generally forgettable afternoon for Waterford, who had hoped to book a third successive Munster final appearance. Hurler of the Year Austin Gleeson produced a couple of classy cameo moments, but didn’t have the impact he or manager Derek McGrath would have wished for – and he was replaced in the second half.

The sides went in level at 0-10 apiece at the end of a rip-roaring first half. They were level three times inside the opening 13 minutes, but Cork held the lead from the 15th minute until Kevin Moran’s equalising point for Waterford just before the interval.

There were some brilliant individual moments to savour, chief among them a wonderful pick-up and Waterford point from an initially grounded Gleeson in the 10th minute.

Cork’s leading scorer Horgan was inches wide with a goal effort minutes later as the game ebbed and flowed.

With both sides adopting a ‘man on man’ approach, it was bubbling up into an absorbing fixture. By the 19th minute, Cork had managed to get three points clear, 0-8 to 0-5, but Waterford continued to battle. Cork’s fifth

point was another eye-catching score, Conor Lehane fetching Mark Coleman's pass brilliantly before racing away and firing over from the Old Stand side of the field.

The respective puck-out strategies were working well – Cork favouring the superb Coleman on the left touchline on more than one occasion, while Waterford were hitting the flanks and trying to keep the ball away from Mark Ellis. The Cork man was effective in the opening half, but his direct opponent, Pauric Mahony, still managed to get away for three points from play.

Content to hold his position, Ellis was prepared to concede some ground to Mahony and this duel was just one of the many sub-plots from an intriguing game. Approaching half-time, Waterford received a massive psychological lift by drawing level.

Before Moran's equaliser, Waterford goalkeeper produced heroics to deny first Alan Cadogan and then Seamus Harnedy, the latter an absolutely brilliant save low down to his right. Goal opportunities came and went early in the second half and as the game wore on, Cork thrived.

Spillane was dismissed soon after, but Waterford couldn't find a way back in the closing stages as Cork finished strongly. Shanahan had netted in the 46th minute to draw Waterford level at 1-12 to 0-15, but the Déise could only muster 1-5 after half-time.

Cork finished with 10 different scorers ensuring jubilant fans invaded the Semple Stadium sod at full-time to savour a famous win. Cork would go on to win the 2017 Munster Final before losing out to Waterford in the All-Ireland Semi-Final at Croke Park.

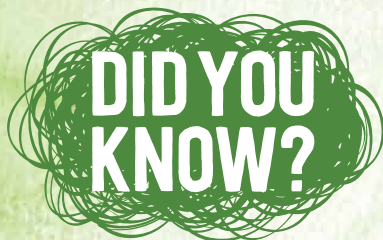

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Cahir's Bloody Sunday hero Jimmy McNamara Remembered

Cahir's Jimmy McNamara, the most successful footballer the town has ever produced, was remembered last September with a wreath-laying ceremony at his final resting place followed by a plaque unveiling outside their GAA grounds on St. Mary's Road. Clubman Colm O'Flaherty also produced a fantastic booklet chronicling the life of "Might Mac" who unfortunately died just nine years after he lined out at centre half forward on Bloody Sunday in 1929.

An all-round sportsman Jimmy excelled at soccer with Cahir Park AFC and, along with his inter-county teammate Tommy Ryan from Castlegrace, was offered an £8-a-week contract by Scottish giants Celtic FC however, both men turned down what was an incredible amount of money at the time and choose to stay at home and focus on Gaelic games.

At 5 foot 4, Jimmy was small for an inter-county footballer and adapted his game to rely on speed and sidesteps to avoid his opponents. Excelling in selling the dummy, Jimmy was noted for his incisive solo runs and moving quickly up the field while in possession. Chatting to Colm O'Flaherty in the 1980s, his Bloody Sunday teammate Bill Ryan from Laha remarked that he was "very fast and skilful".

The youngest of four boys, Jimmy worked in his parents Anne and William's business on Barrack St. which comprised a pub and general provisions shop. At the time, Tipperary were one of the most dominant teams in Gaelic football and Jimmy won a remarkable three Munster Senior Championships (1918, '20 and '22) as well as an All-Ireland Senior medal in 1920. However, due to the political situation in the Country at the time, that game was not played until 1922.

Jimmy was unfortunate not to capture the 1918 All-Ireland title when they were, controversially pipped at the post by the famous four-in-a-row winning Wexford team, 0-5 to 0-4. During the second half Tipperary were denied a goal after the Wexford netminder stepped over the line with the ball however the umpires declined to wave the green flag. To add further woe, star forward Gus McCarthy kicked a last minute chance to level the game wide.

Jimmy continued to play Senior for the County until 1926 and was a selector with the 1928 side which were the last Tipperary team to defeat Kerry in the Championship, 1-7 to 2-3.

Unfortunately, due to the COVID-19 outbreak, the Tipperary GAA Bloody Sunday Commemoration Committee have had to postpone the majority of their events to remember victims of that awful day however it is hoped that these events can proceed in 2021.
