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TODAY'S REFEREE

Colm Lyons (CORK)



When did you start refereeing? I began refereeing back in 2003 after getting a flavour of refereeing Cumann na mBunscol Primary Schools matches. I then attended an excellent referees' beginners course over four nights facilitated by referee tutor John Motherway.

What finals have you refereed? I've been lucky so far to have refereed a number of high-profile hurling games within Cork and outside the county. I've refereed numerous underage county finals as well as Minor, 21, Junior, Intermediate finals, along with three Senior County Premier Hurling Finals. In Munster, I've refereed two Munster Minor Finals (2009 and 2012) as well as one Senior Club Final (2013). On the intercounty scene I've been in charge of the All-Ireland Minor Final in 2012 and the following year I refereed the Under 21 All-Ireland Final. I've been fortunate enough to have acted as linesman for two Senior All-Ireland finals in 2014 and 2016 along with standby referee for the 2017 Final. I refereed the 2017 Allianz Hurling League Final between Galway and Tipperary, the 2017 Leinster Hurling Final between Wexford and Galway and the 2018 and 2020 All-Ireland Club Senior Hurling Finals.

What advice would you have for any aspiring referee? I have huge respect for any person who decides to take up the whistle or officiates in matches whether they are referee, linesman or umpire. It can be challenging but ultimately very rewarding. My advice would be to be confident with your decisions, try and learn from your mistakes and be open to taking advice. Your team of umpires as well as you are so vital, so choose them carefully.

Describe your funniest moment to date as a referee? In fairness, there is always good craic in matches. Probably one that sticks out for me is two lads playing in a Senior League football match in Cork deciding as to who would take a penalty and they played a game of rock, paper, scissors. After they finally decided on best out of three, the penalty was saved!

If you could change one rule in hurling, what would it be? I think the game of hurling has never been healthier and it's such a great spectacle. I can however see the merits of a 10-minute sin-bin for cynical fouling.

HENRY SHEFFLIN - 2012
After recovering from four operations in five years to claim the 'Hurler of the Year' award for the third time in 2012, Henry Shefflin duly deserved his status as one of the greatest stickmen in the history of our hallowed sport. An supreme hurling brain, he has inspired thousands with his 'do or die' leadership and his vast and astonishing range of skills.

TONY KELLY - 2013
Fleet of foot, blessed from the heavens with a silky stick, Tony Kelly's heroic feats raised the masses in 2013 when he made history by collecting both the Hurler of the Year and Young Hurler of the Year awards. Just 19, Tony was already a prince of the game, ploring his way past Cork's Clare won their first All-Ireland SHC title since 1997 and also driving the county to triumph in that year's All-Ireland Under-21 championship.

RICHEL HOGAN - 2014
All year long Richie Hogan was the key cog in Kilkenny's bullpen. Never one to lean on the luxury of a second spooch, he hit four points in their opening championship game, hit 0-7 in two games against Galway, and grabbed a vital goal that stayed Limerick and battled with 'tu' to bring Tipperary down. He manic intensity, flawless paw, scorching pace, salvaging hunger for ball, and ability to pop up unnoticed in enemy territory made Hogan the hottest property in hurling in 2014.

TJ REID - 2015
With every passing year of his career, TJ Reid's legend grew. Born with wholesome skills and a gritty work ethic, his desire to learn and improve won further helped him throw all those ingredients into the pot to arrive at the perfect mix in 2015. Consensus was achieved in a season that saw him hit 3-25 in just three outings, averaging 11 points a game, leading to the skies, fetching the ball from the clouds, scorching the grass and raising flags - Reid did it all in a golden year.

AUSTIN GLEESON - 2016
The versatile 21-year-old made his debut for Tipperary in 2016. Against Clare in Munster, he was sensational as he scored six special points, five of them from play. In both the drawn and replayed All-Ireland semi-finals against Kilkenny he was equally prolific, hitting a combined 1-7 from play. Austin turned the game techvicolour with his flair, soaring feitches, turbo-charged runs, spectacular score-taking, and raw physicality to claim both the Hurler and Young Hurler awards.

JOE CANNING - 2017
The planets aligned and destiny was fulfilled when Joe Canning became the first Galway player to win the Hurler of the Year award since the legendary 'Smokin' Joe in 1988. All year long Smokin' Joe was seizing the day, scoring from 100 metres, scoring 0-9 in the All-Ireland Final win over Waterford. And to top that, his iconic ball-poop point to beat Tipperary in the All-Ireland semi-final will go down as one of the greatest scores of all time. He ended it with a score of 46 points in Galway's pictorial campaign.

CIAN LYNCH - 2018
It was a season of glory for Cian Lynch in his native Tipperary. He could have been a star in any other county. The 21-year-old played over his entire career in the green and gold. 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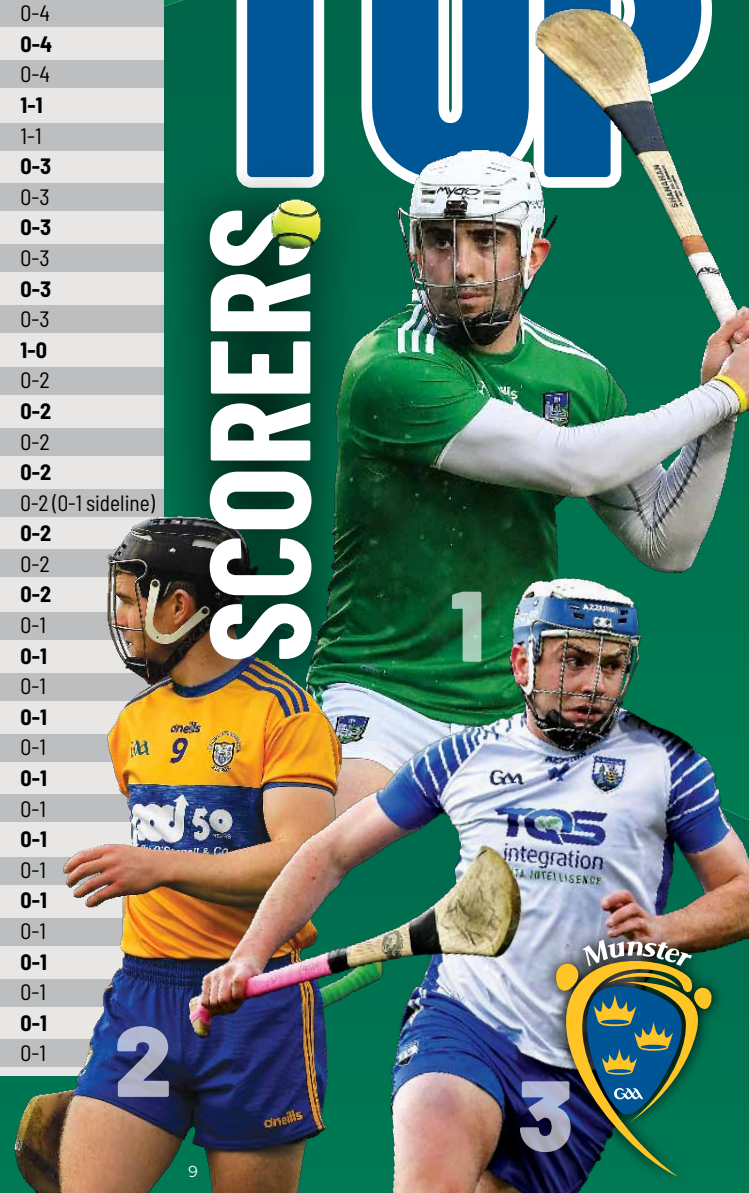

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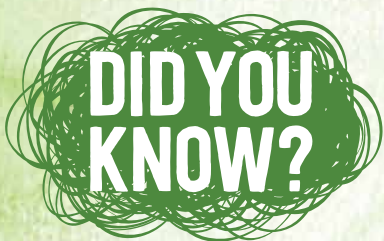

FINAL 6 EMERGE IN RACE FOR 2020 LIBERTY INSURANCE ALL-IRELAND SENIOR CAMOGIE CHAMPIONSHIP

After a long delay the 2020 Liberty Insurance All-Ireland Senior Camogie Championship has roared back into action in recent weeks with some fascinating group stage battles. Ultimately six sides have emerged to contest the knockout stages with many familiar faces in Cork, Galway, Kilkenny and Tipperary as well as an emerging Clare side progressing from the round-robin series.

Galway came into the 2020 Liberty Insurance All-Ireland Senior Camogie Championship hoping to defend their title which they claimed in stunning fashion in 2019. They've been in superb form once more in 2020 and a group stage win over Cork last weekend secured a Semi-Final spot and also laid a marker to the rest of the field of where Cathal Murray's side are in their preparation for another tilt at All-Ireland glory.

Kilkenny too were imperious in their group as they beat all before them to secure safe passage to the Semi-Finals which will take place on Saturday November 28th. The Cats, under the new stewardship of Brian Dowling in 2020, are aiming to reclaim the O'Duffy Cup for the first time since 2016 having gone close on several occasions since.

The Quarter-Finals see perennial challengers Cork aiming to bounce back from that defeat to Galway last weekend and reach another Semi-Final which is the minimum expected of this superb side. They'll face Clare who have been the surprise package of this year's competition and an impressive win over Dublin secured their first Quarter-Final appearance since 2014 following an earlier defeat to Tipperary.

On the other side of the draw a Tipp side who are on an ever-improving positive trajectory in recent years will hope to make it three successive Semi-Final appearance in three years when they face another rising challenger in Waterford. Tipp topped their group with a 100% record and an Déise too have impressed with two wins over Limerick and Westmeath in their group stage campaign – a defeat to Kilkenny the only blemish on their record. As the weeks continue to fly in during this condensed campaign there is no little excitement too and all sides have their eyes set on an All-Ireland date in less than a month's time.

Parallel to the Senior Championship the Premier Junior and Intermediate grades also continue at a breakneck pace with a Finals date on December 5th fast approaching on the horizon for those sides.

The 2020 Liberty Insurance All-Ireland Senior Camogie Championship Final takes place in Croke Park on Saturday December 12th – put the date in your diary and make sure you're there for what promises to be yet another fantastic occasion!

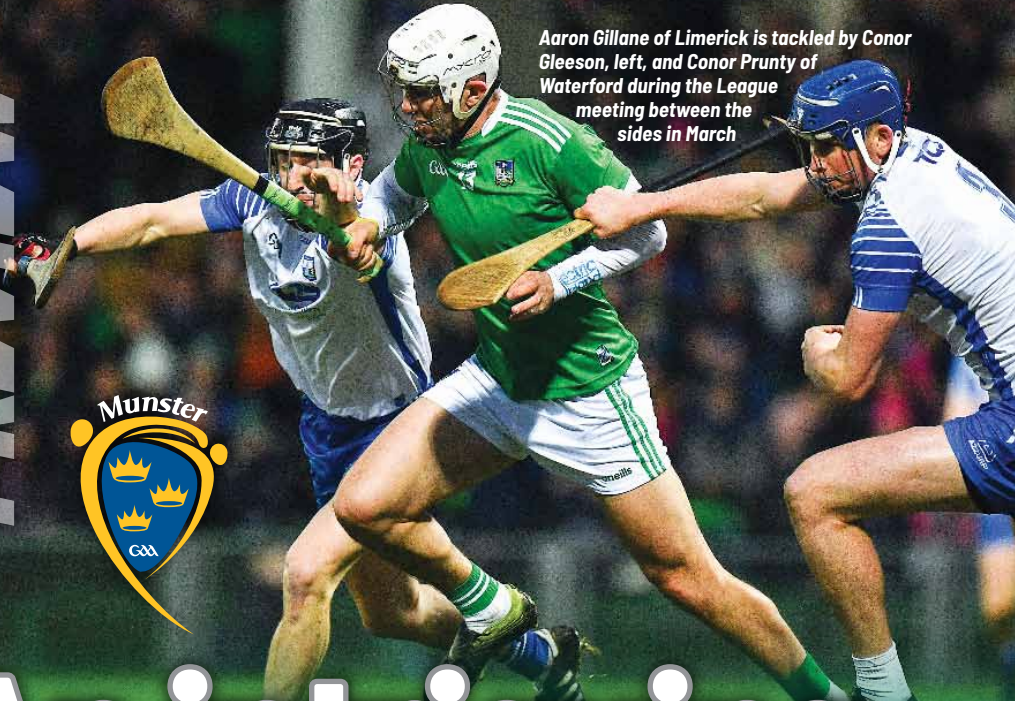

An intriguing battle in store

It's Munster Hurling Final Day – but not as we know it. After a 2020 which has been memorable for all the wrong reasons, we reach the pinnacle of the Provincial Hurling Championship this weekend as Limerick and Waterford face off to secure the Munster title.

Its 1911 since the Munster Senior Hurling Final was played in November. On that occasion, a Castleconnell selection led by John "Tyler" Mackey secured a 5-3 to 4-3 victory over Tipperary played at the Cork Athletic Grounds on November 19th 1911. Tyler's sons Mick and John would go on to win Munster and All-Ireland medals for Limerick in the 1930s and 1940s.

The 2020 Hurling Championship has thrown up some surprises across the country. In the Hurling, Cork were heavily favoured to defeat Waterford in the semi-final but Liam Cahill's men had other ideas. In the other semi-final, while Limerick were favoured to win, a nine-point defeat



for the defending All-Ireland champions Tipperary was an eye-opener. In Leinster, Dublin came from sixteen points down to lose by a solitary point to Kilkenny while Laois came from seven points down in the All-Ireland Qualifiers to lose out to Clare by a point last weekend.

Will today throw up a similar surprise scoreline? Limerick and Waterford have been no strangers to finals in recent years. Since 2015, Waterford have appeared in seven major finals at Senior level (4 Allianz League Finals, 2 Munster Finals and the 2017 All-Ireland Final). Alas, they have been successful in just one of those occasions, the 2015 Allianz League success over Cork

while they also recorded a draw in the 2016 Allianz League Final versus Clare before losing the replay by a point.

In the same time period, Limerick have appeared in four major finals at Senior level (2 Allianz League Finals, 1 Munster Final and the 2018 All-Ireland Final), with the Shannonsiders' recording victories in all four. The

difference between success and disappointment on the big occasion has garnered talk of Limerick being at the start of a dynasty while Waterford are seen to be in the rebuilding phase after two poor Championship campaigns. Neither assertion is probably true to be fair but time will tell.

Waterford came in to 2020 with their third manager in three years. The success of Liam Cahill and Michael Bevens with Tipperary underage sides prompted Waterford to look over the border to the Premier County when they sought to fill the vacant Senior Hurling management positions. After a positive League campaign when many new players were blooded, the impressive semi-final victory over Cork two weeks ago made the hurling world sit up and take notice. While some of the commentary focused on Cork's failure to capitalise on their favourites tag, the heart, determination and the focus showed by the Waterford team on that occasion was notable and but for 15 first half wides, the result would have been secured long before the final whistle.

Seven of the Waterford side which started the Munster Semi-Final win over Cork also started the 2017 All-Ireland Final while debutants such as Dessie Hutchinson and Jack Fagan fitted seamlessly in to the game plan as wing-back Calum Lyons, playing in his second Championship season, accounted 1-2 from play.

Are Waterford ready to dine again at the top table and secure their first Munster title since 2010? Liam Cahill and his management team will certainly instil belief in their players that they are good enough to secure victory today.

Limerick on the other hand are worthy favourites coming in to today's

game on the back of a powerful display against Tipperary in a semi-final played in atrocious conditions as the wind and rain of Storm Aiden let loose on Páirc Uí Chaoimh two weeks ago. While Tipperary struggled to deal with the conditions, Limerick's touch looked assured and allied to an impressive work rate and some shrewd positional changes, there was nothing flattering about their nine-point victory.

Having scored 3-59 in their two wins to date over Clare and Tipperary, it will be a significant task to slow down the Limerick momentum with scores coming from all over the field and off the bench.

One could argue that Limerick could be on the cusp of three All-Ireland titles in a row had they not lost out to Kilkenny by a point in last year's All-Ireland semi-final. To be fair, Limerick did not play well on that occasion and went eight points down and while they reduced the deficit, Kilkenny kept their noses in front in a close finish. The other side of the coin is that Limerick lost three Championship matches in 2019 (to Cork, Tipperary and Kilkenny) while they suffered an eleven-point defeat versus Clare in Ennis in 2018. As good as Limerick have looked in victory, there have been off-days too and Waterford will hope today is one of them.

An intriguing battle is in store before the destination of the Munster Hurling trophy is confirmed this afternoon. Enjoy the game.

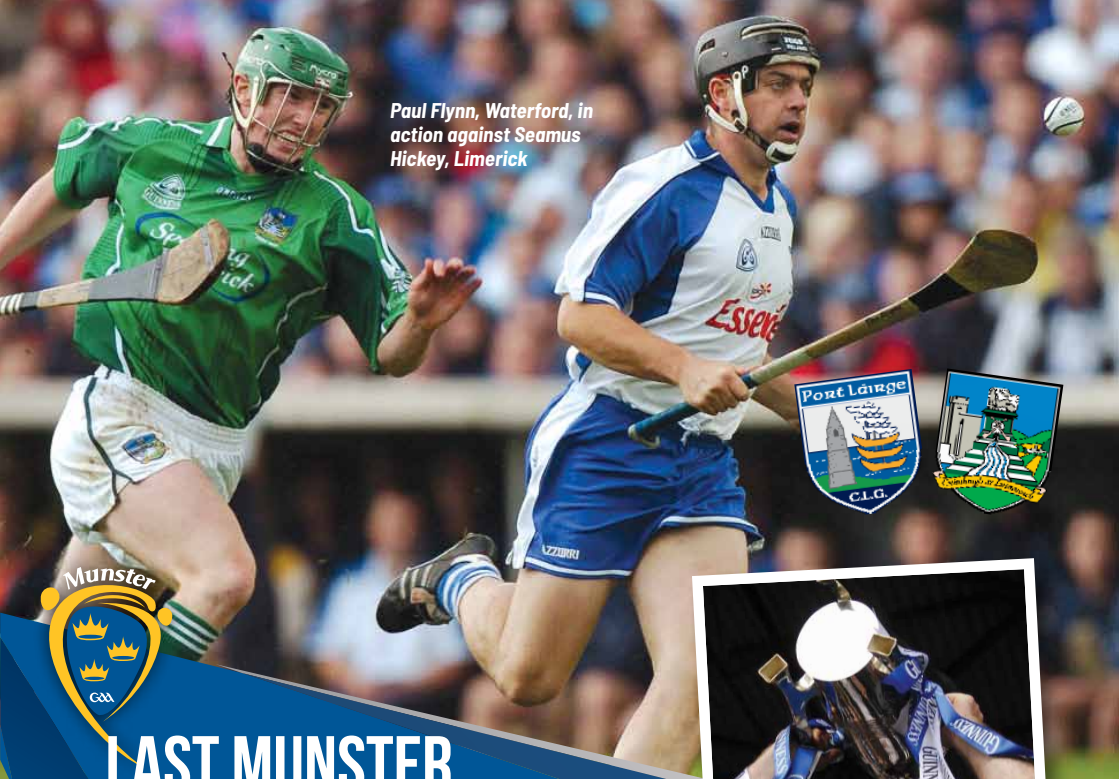

LAST MUNSTER HURLING CHAMPIONSHIP FINAL MEETING - 2007

WATERFORD 3-17 LIMERICK 1-14

The last meeting of Waterford and Limerick in a Munster Senior Hurling Final took place on Sunday July 8th 2007 at Semple Stadium Thurles.

In an era where each of the five Munster counties reached the Provincial decider over a three year period (2006 to 2008), the Munster Finals were eagerly contested and tickets were a scarce commodity.

48,371 were fortunate enough to attend this clash of a Waterford team seeking their third Munster title in five years following a famine of 39 years (1963 to 2002). While Limerick were contesting their first Provincial Final since 2001 and seeking their first Munster title since 1996.

Under the management of Richie Bennis, Limerick qualified for the Final following a trilogy of epic semi-final matches versus Tipperary, eventually coming out on top in the second replay after extra time by

0-22 to 2-13. Waterford on the other hand under the stewardship of Justin McCarthy secured a semi-final victory over a weakened Cork team after a high-scoring encounter, winning by 5-15 to 3-18 with Dan Shanahan in good form, scoring 2-1.

The Final itself saw Limerick get off to a better start thanks to a Brian Begley goal in the seventh minute. Limerick stayed in front for most of a low scoring first half before Waterford nudged themselves in front by a point at the interval, 0-9 to 1-5.

Limerick started the second half well and led by two points after 45 minutes. Waterford's first goal arrived in the 52nd minute when Paul Flynn's shot was well saved by Limerick goalie Brian Murray only for Dan Shanahan

to follow up and raise the green flag. Limerick would remain in contention up to the hour mark before Shanahan struck again in the 62nd minute to dispatch his and Waterford's second goal to put some daylight between the side.

Waterford finished with a flourish with a series of points before Dan Shanahan secured a hat-trick of goals in the 70th minute to ensure the Deise won by a flattering nine-point margin.

Limerick and Waterford would meet again in the 2007 All-Ireland Semi-Final where Limerick turned the tables, scoring five goals to qualify for their first All-Ireland Final since 1996 by virtue of a 5-11 to 2-15 victory.

Limerick would lose out to Kilkenny in the 2007 All-Ireland Final and a similar fate transpired for Waterford when they lost out to Kilkenny in the 2008 All-Ireland Final.

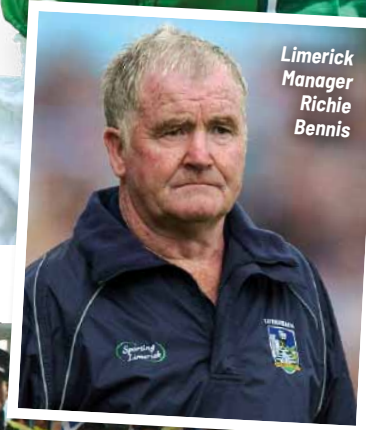

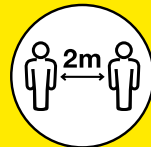

HISTORY IRELAND PODCAST

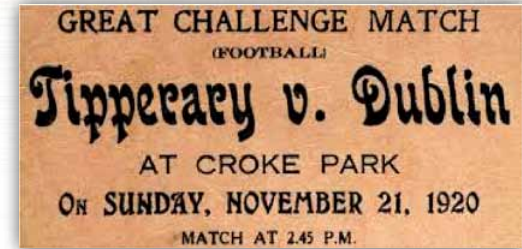

Sunday 21st November, 1920. The great challenge match between Tipperary and Dublin. Tipperary footballer Michael Hogan along with 13 innocent spectators lost their lives on that fateful day 100 years ago in Croke Park, a date which changed the course of Irish history and forever changed the history of the GAA.

History Ireland in association with Tipperary County Council Heritage Office and the Tipperary GAA Bloody Sunday Committee has recently recorded a panel discussion podcast on Bloody Sunday which is now available to view. Chaired by History Ireland Editor Tommy Graham hear the insights and perspectives from this excellent panel of speakers:

AGOAN Ó FEARGHAIL, Former President of the GAA; **JOHN FLANNERY**, Historian from Ormond Historical Society; **ENDA O'SULLIVAN**, Secretary of the Tipperary GAA Bloody Sunday Committee; **JAYNE SUTCLIFFE**, Tipperary Museum of Hidden History.

The panel journey through the history, significance and impact of this momentous event during the War of Independence with particular reference to the GAA within the



Premier County. Hear some poignant personal stories of the victims and the players along with fascinating insights into how the events of the day unfolded in such a tragic and brutal manner.

The panel discuss the story of Michael Hogan from Grangemockler, his tragic death, his famous siblings and the accounts of his funeral back in Tipperary following Bloody Sunday.

Covid 19 has meant that a number of planned events to commemorate Bloody Sunday were deferred however this recording has allowed an online history discussion to take place which is now available for viewing. The recording of the podcast was supported by Tipperary County Council and the Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Sport and Media.

EXTRA TIME AND FINISHING GAMES ON THE DAY

All games in the 2020 Munster GAA Senior Football & Hurling Championship that finish level after normal playing times should be completed as per the GAA Ard Chomhairle Regulations approved on the 19th January 2019 and in accordance with Rules of Specification 3.4. & 3.6 T.O. Part 2 2019, that relevant games that finish level after normal playing times should be completed as follows -

PHASE 1

- Proceed to Extra time as provided for in T.O Cuid II (two periods of ten minutes each way)

PHASE 2 (Penalty Kicks/Pucks)

If still level, a "penalty competition" to decide the outcome:

- The relevant rules in T.O. Cuid II shall apply in relation to Penalty Kicks/Pucks, unless otherwise stated.
- Penalties will be taken for goals only.
- The Referee shall choose the end at which the penalty kicks/pucks will be taken. The end may be changed by the referee if it becomes unplayable during the course of the penalties.
 - If a penalty is scored, the goal umpire, will wave the green flag once the referee has signalled
 - If the penalty is saved or missed the point umpire will signal a wide once the referee has signalled
- Each team shall register five penalty takers, a goal keeper & a substitute goal keeper with the referee and indicate in which order the penalty takers will take their penalties. (A penalty taker can also be a goalkeeper or a substitute goalkeeper.)
- Only players who are on the field of play at the end of Phase 1 (i.e. end of Extra Time), shall be allowed to be registered as a penalty taker or goalkeeper. Exception: The substitute goalkeeper can come from the team panel.
- Subject to the conditions below both teams will take five penalty kicks/pucks which are taken alternately by the teams. The game is awarded to whichever team scores more of their five penalty kicks/pucks.
 - If, before both teams have taken five penalty kicks/pucks, one team has scored more goals than the other team could score, even if they were to complete their five penalty kicks/pucks, no more penalty kicks/pucks shall be taken.
 - If, after both teams have taken five penalty kicks/pucks and both teams have scored the same number of goals, the penalty competition will continue but in sudden death format using the same five registered players until one team has scored a goal more than the other from the same number of kicks/pucks.
- In sudden death, the same sequence of penalty takers does not have to be followed as in the first round of penalty kicks/pucks.
- Each penalty kick/puck is taken by a different player. All registered players must take a penalty kick/puck before any player can take an additional penalty kick/puck.

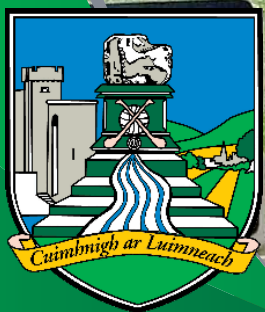
